1. Welcome (Gary Mekjian)

a. Roll Call /Determination of Quorum - Roll call was taken. The 21 members listed below were in attendance, which was sufficient for a quorum.

b. Introductions of ARC guests

G. Mekjian asked all guests in attendance to introduce themselves.

c. Additions or Changes to the Draft Meeting Agenda

There were no additions or changes made to the draft meeting agenda.

d. Approval of October 26, 2010 Meeting Summary

A motion was made by Paul Smith, Plymouth, to approve the October 26, 2010 meeting summary. It was seconded by Jeff Mueller, Lathrup Village, and passed unanimously.

2. Treasurers/Finance Committee Report (D. Rohraff, Treasurer)

a. 2010 Budget Amendments

Gary Mekjian introduced Don Rohraff, Livonia, as the new ARC Treasurer and thanked him for taking over the duties after Dan Swallow left for another position outside the watershed.

Don Rohraff reviewed the 2010 budget amendments as follows:

- PIE Amendment 2: Transfers a \$10,225.92 balance from 2010 PIE Budget (PIE 1 –
 Green Infrastructure Activities) to Organization and Technical Committee
 facilitation and financial and administrative tasks in the 2010 ED Services Budget.
- GLRI 1 Amendment 1 (Transforming the Rouge): Adjusts the 2010 ARC budget to show \$18,182.12 expended on this project in 2010. Originally, the total grant was booked in the 2011 budget. The 2011 GLRI 1 budget was adjusted accordingly.
- GLRI 2 Amendment 1 (Danvers Pond Dam): Adjusts the 2010 ARC budget to show \$8,940.77 expended on this project in 2010. Originally, the total grant was booked in the 2011 budget. The 2011 GLRI 2 budget was adjusted accordingly.
- SPAC 1 Amendment 1 (Green Corridors in the Rouge River Watershed): Adjusts the 2010 budget to show a grant from the Public Advisory Committee through the Great Lakes Commission to the ARC for \$6,000 to review green infrastructure projects appropriate for submission for grants.
- SPAC 2 Amendment 1 (Strategy to Delist BUIs): Adjusts the 2010 ARC budget to show costs incurred of \$11,607.68 rather than \$8,882. The 2011 SPAC 2 grant budget was adjusted accordingly.
- OC3 Accounting and Legal Services: Adjusts the 2010 ARC budget to show
 additional costs in the amount of \$1,308.75 incurred by the accountant in
 preparing the required policies, procedures, accounting manual and the Office of
 Management and Budget questionnaire as requirements of the EPA GLRI grant
 and the review of the 501(c)(4) application.

The motion was made by Gary Zorza, Farmington Hills, to amend the 2010 budget as presented by the Treasurer. The motion was seconded by Shawn Keenan, Auburn Hills, and passed unanimously.

b. 2011 Budget Status Report

The A/R and A/P report was handed out along with a profit and loss report for the 2011 budget. D. Rohraff reported that the first set of ARC invoices for 2011 dues were sent out with the second set to be sent in May. D. Rohraff also informed the Full ARC that the final budget vs. actual for 2010 will be sent out after we receive the last grant reimbursement from Wayne County.

c. 2011 Budget Amendments

- D. Rohraff reviewed the 2011 budget amendments as follows:
- Organization Committee Amendment 1: Corrects the 2011 ARC Budget to show
 a cost for Executive Director Services of \$168,803, of which \$9,032 will be in-kind
 match to the ARC. The ARC will only pay ECT, Inc. \$159,771 in 2011 as requested
 by the Organization Committee. The original 2011 ARC Budget showed the ED
 Services cost as \$159,771 and ECT match as \$9,032.
- Technical Committee, Amendment 1: Corrects the 2011 ARC Budget to show a \$20,000 increase to the Executive Services Contract - Technical Committee

Budget for the Water Quality Summary. This cost has been paid in the past by the ARC through Wayne County. This expenditure is in the 2011 ARC budget. However, Wayne County has requested that the ARC pay for the report directly in 2011 through the Executive Director Services contract, as CDM will subcontract to ECT, Inc.

- GLRI 1 Amendment 1 (Transforming the Rouge): Adjusts the 2011 ARC budget to show the remaining budget available after the \$18,182.12 was expended on this project in 2010. Originally, the total grant was booked in the 2011 budget. The remaining 2011 GLRI 1 budget is \$811,817.88.
- GLRI 2 Amendment 1 (Danvers Pond Dam): Adjusts the 2011 ARC budget to show \$8,940.77 expended on this project in 2010. Originally, the total grant was booked in the 2011 budget. The remaining 2011 GLRI 2 budget is \$490,314.23.
- SPAC 2 Amendment 1 (Strategy to Delist BUIs): Adjusts the 2011 ARC budget to show costs incurred of \$11,607.68 rather than \$8,882 in 2010. The remaining 2011 SPAC 2 grant budget is \$10,597.

The motion was made by Jeff Mueller, Lathrup Village, to amend the 2011 budget as presented by the Treasurer. The motion was seconded by Jim Wineka, Oakland County, and passed unanimously.

3. Executive Director Report

a. Permit Subcommittee

Jim Ridgway informed the ARC that permit litigation continues to proceed through the courts. The MDEQ withdrew the 2008 permit and had hoped that this would satisfy the communities. The attorneys of several communities have chosen to continue the litigation and have questioned the validity of the 2003 permits as well. The MDEQ has initiated a task force to negotiate an acceptable permit. He stated that staff will continue to attend the working group that the state has put together. J. Ridgway stated that the DEQ is looking at the individual permits and then trying to figure out how watershed groups fit in. The next MDEQ work group meeting is scheduled for May 5.

b. Grant Status Report

J. Ridgway gave a status report for the current and submitted grants. GLRI Grants

GLRI 1 (Transforming the Rouge)

- Valley Woods Wetland: in design phase (Southfield is paying for this as match)
- Rouge Park and Eliza Howell Park Grow Zones: in design phase; waiting for Memorandum of Understanding from the City of Detroit to do burns.
- Wayne County Lola Valley (Upper) and Lower Rouge Parkway Grow Zones: WC
 Parks has signed off on design; bid documents are being developed.
- Project QAPP was developed and approved by EPA
- First pre-monitoring benthic survey was held by FOTR and Wayne County on January 22
- Filed first quarterly report on EPA's GLAS system.

GLRI 2 (Danvers Pond Dam Removal)

 Staff is addressing comments from state on the permit for this project (Design was done in 2008 by ECT). Staff is also reviewing comments from the City of Farmington Hills

Rouge Round X Grants

- RPO 1 RGC Urban Habitat Improvement. This IAA has been signed by Wayne County and can proceed.
- RPO 2 Wayne Road Dam Removal Design. A survey has been completed at the dam.

SPAC/BUI Delisting Grant

- A presentation was made at the Technical Committee. The list of ARC/community projects being proposed in this document are on the ARC website for review by ARC members.
- Work must be done by March 31, with a final report due to the GLC by April 30.

2011 Grant Applications

- NOAA Fisheries Grant; The ARC submitted a \$1.1 million proposal to remove Wayne Road dam and install native plants.
- MDEQ CMI Monitoring Grant; This grant is for \$50k to do water quality monitoring in the Upper and Main 1-2 E. coli priority areas to narrow down sewage discharges during dry weather conditions. The time frame for the project would be fall 2011 – winter 2013.
- GLRI 2011; The ARC is partnered with the Alliance of Downriver Watersheds to submit a grant which falls under Implement Lakewide Management Plan (LaMP)
 Projects (I.D.2, page 19), a \$300,000 project to install grow zones in schools through the Green Schools Program managed by Wayne County (it includes schools in the ADW and ARC) with workshops, public education, etc.

Kelly Cave reported that Wayne County also submitted under the toxics reduction category of the GLRI funding for IDEP and Household Hazardous Waste collections which will be Wayne County wide.

J. Ridgway said he believes that the GLRI will continue to get funded and the ARC staff will continue to chase these funds in the future.

c. 2010 Executive Director Annual Report

J. Ridgway presented the Executive Director's Annual Report. The report will be available on the ARC website, along with the full attachments, and should provide key information that communities can use in preparing their annual reports.

d. IRS 501(c)(3) designation

J. Ridgway informed the Full ARC that the IRS has recommended that the ARC become a 501(c)(3). ARC Staff received our designation letter this week and the letter will be posted on the ARC website.

4. ITC Projects within the Watershed

Cynthia Stump, ITC Local Government and Community Affairs and Patty Stephanoff, Vegetation Manager, gave a presentation regarding the activities that ITC is working on within the watershed. The presentation can be found on the ARC website.

5. Standing Committee Reports

a. Organization Committee

K. Cave stated that the Organization Committee has not met yet in 2011 but future meetings will cover updating the ARC Bylaws and Strategic Plan document.

b. PIE Committee (Brandy Siedlaczek, Chair)

Zachare Ball reported for Brandy Siedlaczek. The PIE hosted a grow zone workshop on 4/13 with Friends of the Rouge and had a PIE Committee meeting last week. Z Ball reported that rain barrel sales are being planned for Farmington Hills, Westland and Southfield.

c. Technical Committee

Gary Zorza reported that as part of the 2010 budget, Oakland County identified 7 illicit connections in the E. coli priority area in Farmington Hills. Oakland Conty's 2011 IDEP work plan has not been established yet, but they will likely focus on completing investigations in the same area. Many homes will require inspections and they are looking at ways to get more funding.

G. Zorza informed the Full ARC that the beta test workgroup continues to refine the web-based reporting system. They will be bringing it to the Technical Committee and then open it to the full ARC. The Beta test group has been reviewing all aspects of the reporting system but it will be a learn-as-we-go once it is released to the full ARC. One thing the beta test group has been discussing is the need for a common year-end date for watershed-wide final reporting. There was some discussion about the end of the year being the easiest for all communities. The ARC Staff and other partners like Friends of the Rouge would enter their data which reduces the need for the communities to enter the same data. Gary stated that they will be sending out a survey about current reporting dates and the communities willingness to change if necessary.

Annette DeMaria reported on the 2001-2010 macroinvertebrate (bug) trends provided by Wayne County and Friends of the Rouge. She reported that the spring bug quality scores indicated statistically significant upward trends in most of the Subwatershed Management Areas (SWMAs). This indicates an improvement in water quality. The fall bug hunt scores were not as good, but there were no declining trends. This information will be included in the 2011 FOTR annual and be available on the ARC website.

A. DeMaria reported that the monitoring in 2011 will be happening at 2 stations in the Middle Rouge. USGS will be installing monitoring equipment and will be monitoring 6 months of DO, flow and temperature.

The next Technical Committee meeting is scheduled for May 12, 2-4 p.m. in Farmington Hills with a drawing for free movie tickets if enough people attend the meeting.

6. Report from WCDPS

Kelly Cave informed the Full ARC that the State has a new general permit for Brine and suggested that those communities that use it during the winter months in preparation for ice review the new requirements.

- K. Cave stated that Dean Tuomari will be conducting another IDEP training class and the dates will be passed on as soon as they are finalized.
- K. Cave stated that the draft of the 2010 Rouge Progress Report will be sent out to everyone for review.
- K. Cave stated that USEPA Region V is reinterested in the Rouge efforts and the Water Division Director would like a tour of the watershed.
- K. Cave reported that the earmark process does not look favorable for the Rouge. The County continues to work on 2012 funding but we may not make the list.
- K. Cave informed the Full ARC that Wayne County is working on the Round X sub-grants and there is the potential for another round of grant funding.
- K. Cave informed the Full ARC that Butler Benton has retired and that Lewanda Jackson is the new director with all other staff remaining in their current positions.

6. Opportunity for Public Comment

Amy Mangus reported for SEMCOG that they are working with DWSD to implement green infrastructure in the Upper Rouge. They are also working on demolishing homes and looking at additional green infrastructure opportunities. SEMCOG is also working in Lake St. Clair to control phragmites and doing weed management in the Lake Erie cooridor. They are working with Washtenaw and Livingston Counties and the Phase II communities regarding their permit options. A. Mangus reported that the Municipal Training is done and they are working on the next phase of the training. She informed the Full ARC that they are still doing PIPS and SWIPPS and that they can come in prior to and be at audits.

A. Mangus reported that Chuck Hersey continues to work on the State Revolving Fund reform. They are looking at promoting good activities and management and revising the existing process (0% interest rate and reducing the bureaucracy). More information can be found on the SEMCOG website and:

Sally Petrella reported for Friends of the Rouge that the Rouge Rescue for this year has 37 sites and if you are interested in helping out please contact their office. She reported that May 4 is the Rouge Education Project monitoring day. Upcoming fundraisers include

the FOTR golf outing on May 23, the Detroit River Boat Tour on August 2 and the Rouge Run on September 17 on the Lower Rouge Trail in Canton.

ALLIANCE OF ROUGE COMMUNITIES NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Nature of Organization

Alliance of Rouge Communities (ARC) was formed in 2005 as an unincorporated association operating under and authorized by Part 312 of the Michigan Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act. ARC is a voluntary public watershed entity. Its members consist primarily of municipal governments located in Wayne, Oakland and Washtenaw counties. ARC's purpose is to encourage watershed-wide cooperation and mutual support to meet water quality permit requirements and to restore beneficial uses of the Rouge River to the area residents.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The organization considers all cash and amounts due from depository institutions to be cash equivalents for purposes of the statement of cash flows.

Revenue and Expenses

Membership dues are recognized in the period for which they cover. Dues cover the calendar year in which they are billed. Grant reimbursements are recognized in the period in which the reimbursable expenses are recognized.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with general accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income Tax Status

Alliance of Rouge Communities originally applied for Federal tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(4) but subsequently changed its application for exemption under Section 501(c)(3). See subsequent event note.

ALLIANCE OF ROUGE COMMUNITIES NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS:

The Organization has a contract with ECT, Inc. for Executive Director services. The Executive Director is a shareholder and employee of ECT, Inc. The amount billed from ECT, Inc. totaled \$340,366 and \$320,840 for 2010 and 2009, respectively.

NOTE 3 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK:

The Organization maintains its cash account in a commercial bank located in Michigan. The account is guaranteed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, the balance was fully insured.

NOTE 4 - RECEIVABLES:

Accounts receivable consists of membership dues that have not been paid at December 31, 2010 and 2009 and unsubmitted requests for reimbursement from local and federal agencies under the various grant agreements.

The Organization believes all receivables are collectible and therefore has no allowance for doubtful accounts.

NOTE 5 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS:

On April 11, 2011 ARC received approval for exemption of Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Subsequent events have been evaluated through June 25, 2011, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

BACKGROUND: In 2011, the ARC and the Rouge RAP Advisory Committee submitted a grant request to the Great Lakes Commission (GLC) for a Public Advisory Committee (PAC) grant to support activities to continue to expand on addressing the beneficial use impairments in the Rouge River Area of Concern as well as developing a subwatershed delisting strategy for the Upper Rouge Subwatershed. The grant request was for \$24, 989 for a grant period from May 4, 2011-March 31, 2012. The ARC was awarded the funding in May, 2011.

DESCRIPTION OF ANTICIPATED ACTIVITIES: The GLC/PAC grant will be used to build on the work the ARC and RRAC has accomplished in the past year by completing the following tasks:

1) Improve and refine the Rouge River AOC Beneficial Use Impairments Delisting Strategy (Delisting Strategy) developed just recently under the previous PAC grant, 2) Create a Subwatershed Delisting Strategy Template based on the activities and projects included in the Delisting Strategy that will illustrate the community projects, the areas to install Rouge AOC priority projects, such as tree planting and grow zones, their location, expected storm water reduction impacts and any project gaps that may exist, and 3) Coordinate activities in the Rouge AOC.

RATIONALE: The budget must be adjusted to reflect this additional funding.

BUDGET: This amendment adds the 2011 GLC PAC grant budget line to the 2011 ARC Budget with funding of \$24,989 for these activities. No match is required.

PERSON/AGENCY RESPONSIBLE FOR IMPLEMENTATION: Work will be completed by the ARC Executive Director Staff and Wayne County.

Ongoing Grant Projects

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI)

GLRI 1 (Transforming the Rouge)

- The Wayne County Parks project (Lola Valley and Lower Rouge) construction has been bid out and a contractor has been selected. Work is scheduled for the fall.
- Valley Woods Wetland (Southfield): Field activities, including surveying and a wetland report, have been completed. A permit pre-application meeting with MDEQ was conducted on site on May 17, 2011. The design will include filling of drainage ditches, a prescribed burn, excavation of phragmites and planting and seeding. Herbicide applications will be in late August-early September.
- Rouge Park and Eliza Howell Park Grow Zones: We are currently negotiating with the City of Detroit concerning prescribed burns in both parks. A Memorandum of Understanding with the City of Detroit is under review. This project will begin in Spring, 2012.
- The second pre-monitoring benthics survey was held by FOTR and Wayne County on April 30.
- The second quarterly report was filed on May 5.

GLRI 2 (Danvers Pond Dam Removal, Farmington Hills)

- MDEQ conducted a public hearing about the permit application package on June 8.
- ARC staff is working with the EPA grant manager to develop a definition of native species.
- The original design documents (2008) have been updated to include recent changes and comments.
- Construction will be in 2012.

Rouge Round X

RPO 1

Rouge Green Corridor Urban Habitat Improvement

• The schedule for this project has been moved back. The riparian buffer development at sites in Beverly Hills, Southfield and Birmingham will be in May, 2012.

RPO 2

Wayne Road Dam Removal Design

- All field work has been completed. (survey, sample analysis and geomorphology)
- ARC staff conducted a permit pre-application meeting with MDEQ.
- ARC staff developed a system model and ran the design alternatives. A final design has been selected and is being completed.
- The permit application package is being drafted and will be submitted in July.
- This grant should end in August and transition into the NOAA grant for the removal of Wayne Road Dam.

SPAC 2/Rouge AOC Beneficial Use Impairment Delisting Criteria

• This grant is completed, and the final report was accepted by the Great Lakes Commission.

SPAC 3: Developing a Coordinated Effort to Address Rouge AOC BUIs in the Upper Subwatershed

• This grant for \$24,989 was approved in May by the Great Lakes Commission. ARC staff is currently developing an Upper Subwatershed map that shows ongoing projects and potential future projects eligible for future grant funding.

NOAA Fisheries Grant - Wayne Road Dam Removal:

• NOAA notified the ARC in May that it would like to fund this project. ARC staff has edited the proposal based on NOAA comments, including reducing the grant request to just over \$1 million. We are currently awaiting final approval and contract documents.

2011 Grant Applications

NOAA Fisheries Grant: See above

Statewide Public Advisory Committee/Great Lakes Commission Grant: See above.

MDEQ Monitoring Grant: This grant is for \$50k to do water quality monitoring in the Upper and Main 1-2 E. coli priority areas to narrow down sewage discharges during dry weather conditions. The time frame for the project would be fall 2011 – winter 2013.

GLRI 2011: The ARC was notified in June that this application was not approved for GLRI funding in 2011. The grant proposal was in partnership with the Alliance of Downriver Watersheds for the following:

Under Implement Lakewide Management Plan (LaMP) Projects (I.D.2, page 19), a \$300,000 project to install grow zones in schools through the Green Schools Program managed by Wayne County (it includes schools in the ADW and ARC) with workshops, public ed., etc.

NEW: U.S. Forestry/GLRI 2011: In June, the ARC submitted a \$374,980 grant to the US Forestry Service through the State of Michigan to purchase and plant 2,000 trees in the Rouge River Watershed in partnership with Wayne County and several ARC member communities. DEVELOPING A STRATEGY TO DELIST BUIS IN THE ROUGE RIVER AOC

The proposed project will 1)refine the Rouge River AOC Beneficial Use Impairments (BUIs) Delisting Strategy developed by the ARC in 2010, 2) Develop a subwatershed delisting strategy template, and 3) Coordinate Rouge AOC Activities.

The grant contains the following general elements:

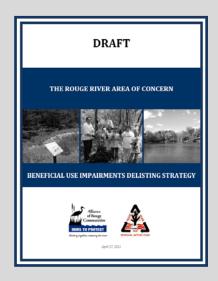
Refine the Rouge River AOC Beneficial Use Impairments (BUIs) Delisting Strategy: Project partners worked diligently on attempting to complete this assessment by March 31, 2011. However, based on comments from grant partners, our AOC coordinator and the Alliance of Rouge Communities, there is information that has to be refined/enhanced in this report, particularly with the Priority Project Activities and site specific summaries. A small portion of this grant will go toward refining this report.

Subwatershed Delisting Strategy Template: The RRAC and the ARC would like to create a Subwatershed Delisting Strategy Template that will include a subwatershed map that illustrates the community projects, the areas to install Rouge AOC priority projects, such as tree planting and grow zones, where they are/would be located, what storm water reduction impacts they may create, and any project gaps that may exist. The strategy target area would be the Upper Rouge Subwatershed, which has been struggling with the impacts of non-point source pollution and is also the priority area for the ARC's Collaborative Illicit Discharge Elimination Program (IDEP) focus. The strategy template will serve as a road map which will detail specific community projects, specific Delisting Strategy priority projects, their locations and what their impacts will be. This template would allow the ARC and this subwatershed to have a comprehensive, coordinated approach to address and solve the impacts and put it in a stronger position to seek funding opportunities. This template would then be used to perform the same analysis in the six remaining Rouge subwatersheds.

Coordination of AOC Activities: There has been an increase in support required by AOC (RRAC) officers related to attendance at stakeholder meetings, coordination with AOC stakeholders regarding projects and letters of support for project to a variety of federal agency funders. This task would support the AOC officers in performing their duties in coordinating requests for support letters and attendance at various meetings involving AOC activities.

<u>Final Report</u>: The final report will include all work products from Tasks 1-3 and outline the next steps needed to work toward delisting the Rouge AOC.

The deliverable for this project will be the Upper Rouge Subwatershed Delisting Strategy Template and a final report that includes all documentation and recommendations from Tasks 1-3.

The three green infrastructure projects to be funded by this grant will:

- Unite the major green corridors along the Rouge River,
- Create a framework to develop consistent priorities for restoration implementation, and
- Improve the Rouge River fisheries by creating green areas that will stabilize flow to encourage a healthy macroinvertebrate population. This will be achieved by improving, installing and enhancing riparian buffers, wetlands and upland habitat in the Rouge River Watershed.

The projects to be completed under this grant are:

<u>Valley Woods Wetland Restoration</u> (Nature Preserve at 10-Mile Road, Southfield, Oakland County)

Restore 7 acres of wetlands and the capacity of wetlands to store and retain storm water from park.

♦ This 27-acre preserve is bound on the northeast, where the Rouge River enters the preserve by two major roads. The river channel meanders through a relatively intact floodplain forest containing mature sycamore, oak and red ash trees. A variety of other tree species including maple and elm, complete the overstory composition of this significantly large, functioning floodplain forest. The plant communities within this preserve are diverse relative to many of the other park/preserve sites; a large emergent marsh is present in the northern end and a shrub-carr wetland is present at the southern end of the preserve. This preserve provides a variety of natural functions, including floodwater retention and storage, wildlife habitat and green space.





Lower Rouge and Upper Rouge Parkway (Wayne County)

Convert approximately 15 acres of managed turf grass to native vegetation grow zones within Wayne County Parks in the Upper and Lower Subwatersheds.

- The Lower Rouge Parkway is nearly 1200 acres of riparian public lands beginning in the City of Dearborn at the downstream end of the Rouge River and extending to Canton Township at the upstream end. Approximately 15 miles of the Lower Rouge River flows through the Lower Rouge Parkway. Wayne County has identified approximately 20 acres of mowed turf area that could potentially be converted to native plant grow zones. With funding as proposed in this grant submittal a minimum of 5 acres would be converted to grow zone.
- ▲ Lola Valley Park is within the Upper Rouge subwatershed and has approximately 1.5 miles of the Upper Rouge River flowing through the 58 acres of riparian parkland owned by Wayne County. Lola Valley Park is completely within Redford Township and winds through a residential neighborhood. The park is approximately one-half mile upstream from the City of Detroit's Eliza Howell Park. Wayne County has identified approximately 12 acres of mowed turf area immediately adjacent to the Upper Rouge River that could potentially be converted to native plant grow zone. With funding as proposed under this grant a minimum of 10 acres would be converted to grow zone.



<u>Eliza Howell Park</u> (City of Detroit, Wayne County)

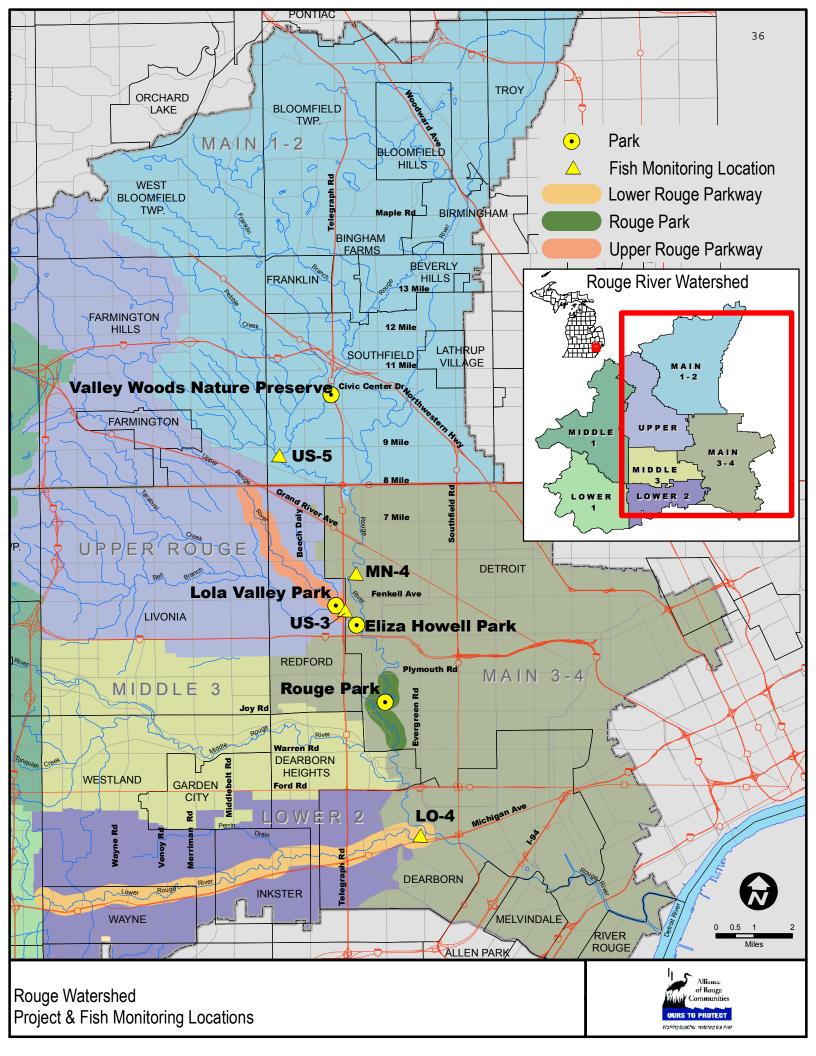
Restore approximately 5 acres of mowed turf grass to native vegetation grow zones. This 200 acre park contains the main stem of the Rouge River and connects the green corridor along this branch.



Rouge River Park (City of Detroit, Wayne County)

Restore approximately 5 acres of mowed turf grass and barren land to native vegetation grow zones. Rouge Park is the City of Detroit's largest park at 1,181 acres. It encompasses 26,000 feet of the Main Branch of the Rouge River and has an abundance of recreational opportunities. The park is home to varied wildlife and includes over 15 acres of restored native prairies.







DANVERS POND DAM REMOVAL AND STREAM RESTORATION

Working together, restoring the river

EPA GLNPO Grant: \$499,254 Start Date: October 1, 2010
Required Match: \$0 Completion Date: August 1, 2012
Total Project Cost: \$499,254

The proposed project will 1)remove the existing dam and create a naturalized water course 2)stabilize erosion using bioengineering and naturalizing techniques 3)restore the former impoundment bottom lands as an open area connected to the stream to dissipate and store flood flows. The project will create and improve habitat and increase water quality in the Creek.

Engineered design plans for restoration were developed under a RPO grant to Farmington Hills and contain the following general elements:

<u>Dam Demolition</u>- The proposed dam demolition consists of the removal of the arch dam structure, wing walls and entire box culvert to the existing 84" x 120" corrugated metal pipe (CMP) culvert. The earth fill outside the box culvert will be re-graded to a 1:3 (v:h) slope and stabilized with rip rap. The existing CMP culvert will be extended to a minimum of 12 feet in order to maintain the proposed 1:3 (v:h) slope from Danvers Drive. The flow of Pebble Creek will then be restored through the existing CMP culvert. The existing culvert under Danvers Road will serve as downstream grade control for the restored stream channel.

Stream Restoration- An artificial riffle will be constructed to control the streambed elevation upstream of the impoundment. It will be constructed with natural boulders and cobbles that are sized such that they are stable and never transported downstream. The riffle sill will be trenched into the streambed and banks to the expected depth of scour. Constructed riffles will be used to dissipate energy and control the stream bed elevation in the restored channel. The design will include restoration of Pebble Creek through the pond after drawdown and dam removal, including active restoration of pattern, profile, and dimension, stream habitat, and an active vegetated floodplain with expected terrestrial wildlife value.

Floodplain Restoration - The bottom lands exposed after draw down of the pond will be restored as natural floodplain, creating a natural buffer and habitat along the restored stream corridor.

Successful implementation of the Danvers Dam Removal and Stream Restoration Project will make substantial progress toward eliminating the Benthos and Fish and Wildlife Habitat BUIs for the AOC. The proposed project also fulfills local and subwatershed goals by improving the quality of the ecosystem and restoring approximately 2 acres of habitat for fish and terrestrial wildlife. The reduction in sedimentation within the creek and the revegetation of 300 linear feet of naturalized stream channel will create improved habitat conditions for fish and wildlife using the Pebble Creek stream corridor. The removal of the dam and the enhancements to Pebble Creek will allow unencumbered fish passage for the entire Pebble Creek, approximately 6.5 miles, and create a natural buffer of native vegetation and wildflowers between private property and the stream corridor.

Removing the Wayne Road Dam is perhaps one of the premier dam removal projects in the Rouge River Watershed.

- The MDNR 1998 Fisheries Assessment identified the Wayne Road Dam as a major impediment to restoring fish and wildlife habitat in the Rouge River. Removing the dam would reconnect the Rouge River to the Detroit River and the Lake Erie ecosystem.
- Removal of the Wayne Road Dam was also a priority project for the Rouge RAP Advisory Council in order to implement the 2008 Delisting Targets for Fish and Wildlife Habitat and Population Beneficial Use Impairments for the Rouge River Area of Concern.
- Removal of the low head dam (Wayne Road Dam) would reconnect approximately 17 miles of river to the Great Lakes system for the first time in over a century.

The Wayne Road Dam is located in the City of Wayne and is in the Lower Branch of the Rouge River which flows through the cities of Westland, Wayne, Romulus, Garden City, Inkster, Dearborn Heights and Dearborn before joining the Main Branch of the Rouge River.

An Engineering and Feasibility Study prepared for Wayne County in early 2010 provides site investigation data and a recommended conceptual design/construction sequence to be used as a basis for detailed design and implementation. The river hosts a variety of fish species in the vicinity of the dam, including trout in upstream areas and a variety of warm water species. (e.g., smallmouth bass, northern pike, walleye, sunfish) downstream of the dam.

Although removal of the Wayne Road dam was not emphasized in the Lower 2 Rouge River Subwatershed Management Plan (May 2001), it supports the following goals of the subwatershed management plan:

- Goal 3: Educate the public regarding their impact on the River and the River's potential as a community asset.
 - o Encourage use of parklands adjacent to the river
- Goal 4: Enhance and preserve habitat for fish and wildlife, espe3cially next to the river, compatible with land uses.

The draft Rouge River Watershed Management Plan (2008) was more direct. A discussion of impairments in the Lower 2 Subwatershed section of the plan stated that the size and diversity of the fish community in the Lower 2 Subwatershed is constrained by the dam at Wayne Road which prevents fish passage within the subwatershed and from Lake Erie.

The MDNR 1998 Fisheries Assessment suggested that removing or providing fish passage at this site would be extremely helpful in enhancing fish communities in the Lower Rouge River by reconnecting the Rouge to the Detroit River and Lake Erie ecosystem. A 2003 report by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers suggested that the Wayne Road dam could probably be removed if necessary, or a fish passage could be "feasibly constructed."

The Rouge Green Corridor (RGC) project (www.oakgov.com/rgc) is a continuing collaboration now in its seventh year. RGC partners include: the cities of Birmingham and Southfield and the Village of Beverly Hills; Oakland County (Water Resources Commissioner, Parks and Planning and Planning and Economic Development), Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority, Friends of the Rouge and Six Rivers Regional Land Conservancy.

The purpose of this grant proposed project is to implement recommendations of the Rouge Green Corridor Urban Habitat Conservation & Stewardship Plan to develop urban habitat and riparian buffers. The project seeks to raise public awareness and stewardship of the critical urban wildlife habitat and recreation feature provided by the Rouge River as it flows through Birmingham, Beverly Hills and Southfield in southeast Oakland County.

The projects to be completed under this grant are:

Riparian Buffer Demonstration Projects: Design and implement (3) riparian buffer demonstration projects on public land in Riverside Park (Beverly Hills), an appropriate location in Birmingham and Valley Woods Trail (Southfield) with the assistance of volunteer labor. The demonstration projects will be designed by Oakland County Planning and Economic Development, maintenance plan created by Oakland County Parks and the volunteer labor will be instructed by Six Rivers Regional Land Conservancy. Details will be featured on the Rouge Green Corridor website.

Rouge Green Corridor Urban Wetland Conservation & Restoration Plan: This plan will be developed by Oakland County Parks and will outline wetland conservation and restoration opportunities, and tools for implementation for the portion of the Rouge Green Corridor between Twelve Mile and Eight Mile roads, including detailed wetland and floodplain inventory and site-specific tools for management, conservation and restoration.

Design and installation of three interpretive signs: Signage will be installed at the riparian demonstration projects located in Riverside Park (Beverly Hills), an appropriate location in Birmingham and at Valley Woods Trail (Southfield) describing the Rouge River Watershed, the Alliance of Rouge Communities, the Rouge Green Corridor, and local habitat and water quality issues.

Public Education Workshop: A public education workshop will be presented targeting riparian homeowners on riparian buffer installation and maintenance and wetland stewardship. The workshop will educate homeowners on best practices for implementing riparian buffers, no mow zones and stewardship of wetlands and floodplain areas on private properties. One of the buffers designed during this workplan will be used as the location for the workshop.

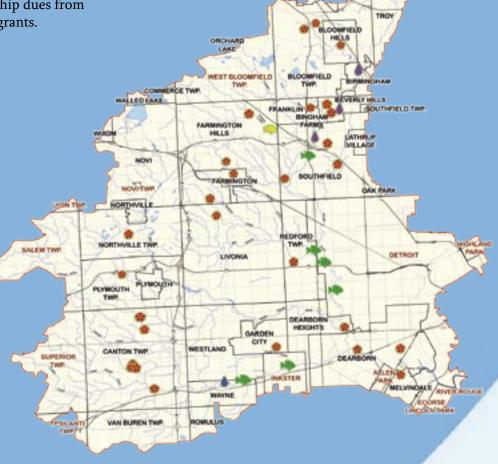

What the ARC is Doing!

The ARC continues to leverage its resources by conducting these projects to restore the river.

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative -

Transforming the Rouge Area of Concern (AOC) From Mowed Down to Grown Up, \$830,000

The three green infrastructure projects to be funded by this grant are:

- Valley Woods Wetland in Southfield This project will restore seven acres of wetlands and the capacity of wetlands to store and retain storm water from the park.
- Lower Rouge and Upper Rouge Parkway in Wayne County Convert approximately 15 acres of managed turf grass to native vegetation grow zones within Wayne County Parks in the Upper and Lower Subwatersheds.
- Eliza Howell Park & River Rouge Park in Detroit Restore approximately 10 acres of mowed turf grass to native vegetation grow zones. These parks contain the main stem of the Rouge river and connects the green corridor along this branch.







Great Lakes Restoration Initiative - Danvers Pond Dam Removal and Stream Restoration, \$499,254

The Danvers Pond project, located in Farmington Hills, will:

- Remove the existing dam and create a naturalized water course
- Stabilize erosion using bioengineering and naturalizing techniques
- Restore the former impoundment bottom lands as an open area connected to the stream to dissipate and store flood flows. The project will create and improve habitat and increase water quality in the Creek.

ARC Committees

The Executive Committee is comprised of a maximum of 13 voting members consisting of the elected Chair, Vice-Chair and Treasurer of the ARC; one representative or alternate from each member county, and

one representative or alternate from each of the seven Subwatershed **Advisory Groups** (SWAGs) established for the Rouge River Watershed.



The Executive Committee is chaired by the ARC Chairperson

and supervises the expenditure of ARC monies consistent with the budget, coordinates the transition of responsibility for storm water management to the ARC, supervises staff, arranges support services, and provides a forum for discussion.

The Finance Committee is chaired by the Treasurer of the Alliance. The Finance Committee members represent several ARC communities and other interested parties.

The Finance Committee monitors expenditures and income, prepares the annual proposed budget and financial statement, and conducts other activities as assigned by the Chair or the Alliance.

The Organization Committee considers changes to the Alliance Bylaws, makes recommendations for ARC membership, and makes policy and procedural recommendations to the ARC. Members are appointed to the Organization Committee to reflect the broad diversity of the ARC membership with respect to geographic location, land area and population within the watershed, and type of public agency.

The Technical Committee is comprised of representatives of several ARC communities and other interested parties.

The Technical Committee reviews and makes recommendations for water quality monitoring activities, recommends and oversees activities related to MDEQ storm water permit requirements (e.g., applications, annual reports, SWPPIs, etc.).

The Pubic Involvement and Education (PIE) Committee is comprised of representatives of several ARC communities, non-profit institutions and stewardship groups.

The Public Involvement and Education (PIE) Committee works with ARC members and partners to educate and

engage local elected officials, community staff and the general public about issues affecting the Rouge River Watershed and the ARC. The PIE Committee accomplishes this by providing a variety of public education materials to its members and conducting activities across the watershed that demonstrate ways stakeholders in the watershed can improve water quality.

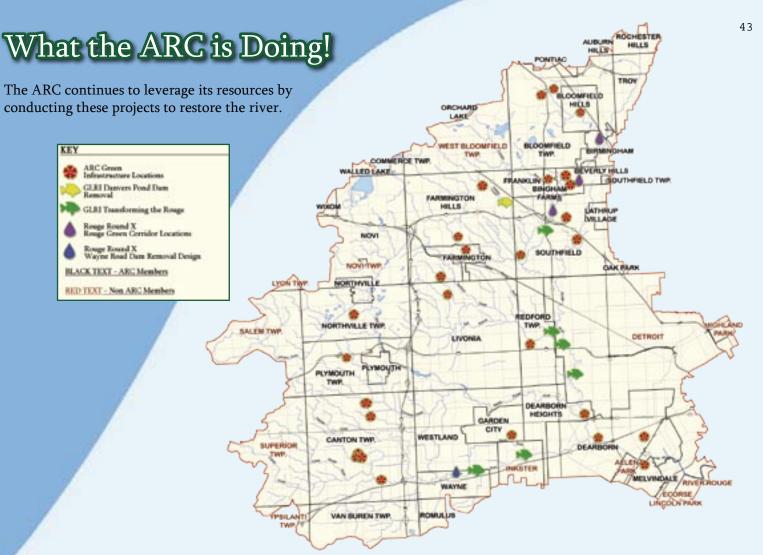
